Questions for Discussion:

- 1. What is contributing to the growth of your spiritual life right now? Be as specific as you can.
- 2. What is the main obstacle to your spiritual life right now? Again, try to be specific.
- 3. Going back to the parable of the soil, the soil being our own lives, who is responsible for keeping it rich and fertile? Who is responsible for your own spiritual growth? Are you fulfilling your responsibility to keep the soil of your own spiritual life rich? If not, what can you do to make it more fertile? Have our MM Formation Resources helped?
- 4. Do you have a responsibility as a husband and father for the spiritual life of your family? Do you take it seriously? If not, why not? Do you ever discuss with your wife your mutual responsibility for the spiritual growth of your children?

Parable of Pharisee and Tax Collector

Lk 18-9-14 different ways of praying

Questions for Discussion:

- 1. What is the one thing which most puzzles you about prayer? What do you find hardest to accept about prayer?
- 2. When you pray, what thoughts most often break in? Do they spring from the prayer, or do they pull you away from the prayer?
- 3. Have you ever felt afraid to pray? Is there something you're afraid of, or afraid to ask? Why?
- 4. What have you prayed for that, when you look back on it, you're glad you didn't get? Or prayed that it would not happen, but you're glad it did? How would your life be different if God had granted those prayers?
- 5. Do you get embarrassed when praying aloud in the presence of others? Do you pray for different things when praying with them than in private?
- 6. Since God knows all about you and what he is going to do before you ask, what do you think might be some reasons God still wants you to pray to Him? What do you expect from prayer?
- 7. What is your favorite type of prayer? Is there any specific position that you like to pray to take during prayer (standing up, sitting down, kneeling, or bowing down, laying down)?

Parable of Good Samaritan

Lk 10: 25-37 reaching out to our neighbor

Questions for Discussion:

- 1. What are the challenges we face to love both God and neighbor and how can we strive to overcome them?
- 2. Who are our neighbors? As parents and grandparents, how can we teach our children and grandchildren to be more aware of the need to support others no matter who they are?
- 3. Have there been situations in your life when you chose not to help someone? What were your reasons for not getting involved?
- 4. Has anyone been a "Good Samaritan" to you or your family? What was it like to feel their support and what did you learn from them? Do you live your life any differently today because of this experience?
- 5. How can we help others understand the lesson our Lord is teaching us in this parable? What is your plan to share today's message with family and friends?

Parable of the Workers in the Vineyard

Mt 20: 1-16 God's word of encouragement

Questions for Discussion:

"To pray, I think, does not mean to think about God in contrast to thinking about other things, or to spend time with God instead of spending time with other people. As soon as we begin to divide our thoughts about God and thoughts about people and events, we remove God from our daily life and put him in a pious little niche where we can think pious thoughts and experience pious feelings. Questions for Discussion:

- 1. If you could invite either of the sons to join your table discussion this morning, which one would it be? What would you ask him and what do you think he might say?
- 2. In what ways does the younger son violate the command to honor his father? How should we face the temptations that interfere with our relationship with the Heavenly Father?
- 3. How does the older son demonstrate lack of honor and trust in his father? Have you ever been in a situation where a source of joy for a family member resulted in your resentment? What did you learn from this experience?
- 4. What is God's attitude toward our failures (or those of people we love) when we (or they) repent? How does this parable challenge us to think about Lent, forgiveness, and the grace received through the Sacrament of Penance?
- 5. As a brother, son, father, or grandfather, has your interpretation of this parable changed as a result of today's discussion? What is your "take away" and how can you share with your family?
